

58 Airports Have Lost at Least One Major Airline; Tri-Cities Airport Has Maintained All Airlines, and Added Two








Tri-Cities' Summer Capacity Will Be Within 6% of the Pre-Pandemic "Normal"




Tri-Cities Fills a Higher Percentage of Airline Seats than Any Other Market in the Pacific Northwest



Passengers Are Rebounding and Fares Are Down; The Average Fare is 13% Less than Before the Pandemic






Washington's Tri-Cities Has Grown by 20% Since 2010, with 12% of New Residents Coming from Los Angeles and 9% Coming from Portland
